Management Discussion of Fund Performance

Investment Objective and Strategies

The NBI Small Cap Fund's investment objective is to provide long-term capital growth and preservation. The Fund invests primarily in common shares of companies chosen for their growth potential. The Fund may also invest in money market instruments and securities of Canadian federal and provincial governments. The Fund makes investments in small capitalization companies which provide investors with additional dynamic growth potential for a diversified portfolio.

The portfolio manager analyzes securities with growth potential. The portfolio manager initially invests a limited proportion of assets in these companies, making further investments if the company lives up to expectations. Generally, the portfolio manager does not invest in medium or large capitalization unless they show earnings growth potential, and favours security selection over sector rotation. The Fund may invest approximately 25% of its assets in foreign equities.

Risks

Results of Operations

For the twelve-month period ended December 31, 2023, the NBI Small Cap Fund's Investor Series units returned 10.20% compared to 4.79% for the Fund's benchmark, the S&P/TSX Small Cap Index (CAD). Unlike the benchmark, the Fund's performance is calculated after fees and expenses. Please see the *Past Performance* section for the returns of all of the Fund's series, which may vary mainly because of fees and expenses.

Certain series of the Fund, as applicable, may make distributions at a rate determined by the manager. This rate may change from time to time. If the aggregate amount of distributions in such series exceeds the portion of net income and net realized capital gains allocated to such series, the excess will constitute a return of capital. The manager does not believe that the return of capital distributions made by such series of the Fund have a meaningful impact on the Fund's ability to implement its investment strategy or to fulfill its investment objective.

The Fund's net asset value dropped by 85.13% over the period, from \$573.04 million as at December 31, 2022 to \$85.19 million as at December 31, 2023.

The decline stemmed mainly from withdrawals in the Fund by other NBI Funds and a rebalancing of the managed solutions offered by NBI.

During the course of 2023, Canadian small-cap equities were volatile but finished on a strong note. North American Central Bank rate hikes appear to be over. Inflation is on its way back within target ranges. Despite the contraction of the Canadian economy and the slowdown in US growth, investors have regained their optimism. They are now anticipating interest rate cuts in the first half of 2024, which is driving markets forward.

Over the course of the year, the S&P/TSX Index returned 11.8%; Information Technology and Health Care were the best performing sectors, gaining 69.2% and 18.3% respectively. Telecommunication Services and Materials were the only two sectors in the red, with respective losses of 3.9% and 1.3%.

Canadian small caps underperformed their larger peers, gaining 5.82% in 2023. The Information Technology and Industrials sectors were the two top-performing sectors with respective returns of 40.4% and 21.7%. The Telecommunication Services and Real Estate sectors were the top detractors, losing 16.9% and 14.5% respectively throughout the year.

In this context, the Fund outperformed its benchmark.

Our performance during the period is mainly explained by the positive contribution of our stock selection in the energy and real estate sectors. On the allocation front, our overweight in the Industrials and in the Financials sectors were also beneficial to the relative performance versus the index.

Our major positive contributors came from EQB, GoEasy, Richelieu Hardware, ATS Corporation, and Parkland Corporation.

Our major negative contributors came from Trisura Group, GDI Integrated Facility Services, Pet Valu, and Mag Silver.

Recent Developments

During the period, we initiated positions in AG Growth, CBIZ, Core & Main, Interfor, Lumine Group, Neogen, NV5 Global, Pason Systems, Phoenix Energy Services, and SPX Technologies.

AG Growth is a manufacturer of agricultural equipment sold to commercial and farming clients. Its products are sold globally. North American sales currently represent the majority of the sales (2/3). We believe that the company has lots of opportunities to grow. It is benefiting from multiple tailwinds like population growth, growth in emerging markets and increasing investments in the food supply chain. The company recently changed its management team and is now focused on cash flow generation and margin improvement. If executed properly, we believe that the stock can re-rate higher than current levels. The company recently published a record backlog and positive outlook, supporting a strong 2023.

CBIZ provides professional business services to corporations to better manage finances, employees, and insurance needs. Its services include accounting, tax, financial advisory, government healthcare consulting, risk advisory and valuation services. It offers its services in more than 33 states in the United States. We like its long-term growth profile as it competes in a large, fragmented, and growing market. Most of its services are recurring in nature and offer cross-selling opportunities across its expanding client base.

Core & Main is a distributor of water, wastewater, storm drainage and fire protection products. We like its leading market share positioning as it is one of two national distributors in the United States. The company was spun out of HD Supply in 2017 and was held privately until it proceeded to its IPO in 2021. Since its IPO, the company has shown consistent growth organically with the construction of new greenfield locations and inorganically with the announcement of multiple acquisitions. We like its exposure to the municipal repair and replacement market that we consider resilient in tougher economic times. We also like its exposure to large infrastructure spending programs that will provide growth over the mid to long term. The company has a great cash flow conversion profile with ample financial capacity to fund future growth while returning capital to shareholders.

Interfor is the fourth-largest softwood lumber producer in North America. The company has operations in British Columbia, in the US South and in Eastern Canada. It has grown primarily through acquisitions. The company has a solid balance sheet to support current lumber prices that have dropped significantly. Although near-term results will be negatively affected by tougher pricing conditions, we believe that current valuation offers a great entry point. Recent economic data and housing demand stabilization are encouraging for a rebound in lumber prices.

Lumine Group is a consolidator of software companies in the communications and media industry. Lumine was recently spun off from Constellation Software and is a newly listed company. Its focus is on acquiring businesses with long-term growth and margin improvement potential. We like its acquisition strategy and free cash flow generation.

Neogen develops, manufactures, and markets products and services for the food and animal safety industry. In addition, Neogen is the largest animal genomics company in the world. The company continues to grow internally with newly developed products and inorganically with acquisitions. It recently closed the largest acquisition in its history when it acquired 3M's Food safety business. We believe that this acquisition has the potential to be transformative once it's integrated. The food and animal safety have large addressable markets that are growing and benefiting from numerous investments. We believe that Neogen has lots of room to grow and increase profitability meaningfully as it integrates its most recent acquisition.

NV5 Global is a leading provider of engineering-related services. It focuses on consulting solutions for public and private-sector clients supporting infrastructure, utility, and building assets and systems. It operates out of more than 100 offices in North America and abroad.

Pason Systems has a leading market share position in the North American land drilling market for electronic data recording. It has a clear technological advantage. We expect it to generate increasing profitability with pricing power and additional drilling activity. We like the strong cash position on the balance sheet. We also like the cash flow that it generates that can be reinvested for internal growth, share repurchases, acquisitions or to pay dividends.

Phoenix Energy Services offers technology services to oilfield service companies. It provides measurement while drilling devices for drilling operations across North America and Internationally. We like its strong balance sheet, technological focus and new product build-out. We believe its solid market share, strong dividend yield and inexpensive valuation make it a great investment.

SPX Technologies is a supplier of engineered products and technologies serving the heating, ventilation and air conditioning, and detection measurement markets. Over the past few years, the company has successfully transformed itself into a more simplified business and now has a more resilient portfolio of products. Most of its revenue comes from replacement demand. We expect it to continue to grow organically with market share gains and accretive M&A.

During the period, we sold our positions in Altus Group, Auto Canada, ECN Capital, Envestnet, Hayward Holdings, Neighbourly Pharmacy, Premium Brands, Sangoma Technologies, SSRM Mining, Tricon Residential, Uni-Select and Wesdome Mines.

In terms of changes to existing positions during the period, we increased our weighting in Logistec, Mainstreet Equity, Shawcor, GDI Integrated Facility Services and Andlauer Healthcare. We decreased our weighting in EQB, Colliers Internatinal, Pollard Banknote, Cargojet and Secure Energy Services.

We are overweighting the sectors with a low correlation with the commodity and energy sectors (Industrials, Consumer Staples, Information Technology, and Real Estate) because we believe in their long-term growth potential that does not depend on high commodity prices and constant access to equity markets to finance growth.

We continue to be underweight in the Energy sector. We remain cautious on the mid to long-term outlook as the green energy transition weighs on investor sentiment and valuation multiples.

We are underweight in the Materials sector. This is mainly explained by our reduced exposure to gold, silver, and base metal companies. We have a difficult time finding suitable long-term investments in this sector.

Our current positioning is the result of our bottom-up, long-term investment approach. We are looking to invest in tomorrow's global leaders that have a clear and defined growth strategy. Our investment horizon is long-term if the business plan is evolving in the right direction.

- The growth of the global economy is presently challenged, and many investors are expecting the economy to slow down as higher interest rates take their toll on consumer sentiment.
- The rise of inflation, increasing energy costs, the lack of productivity caused by labour shortages have notably tempered growth expectations. Although supply chain issues have been resolved in some cases, we continue to monitor closely the availability of certain materials or goods that continue to be difficult to obtain.
- As the trajectory of the economy is difficult to predict, we remain focused on investing in companies that have a strong balance sheet and a resilient business model.
- We expect our companies to be active on the acquisition front and further consolidate their marketplace. We also expect some of our investments to become takeover targets as larger companies or private equity funds deploy their excess capital.

• We are optimistic that the companies held in our portfolio will adapt to a somewhat challenging short-term environment and become stronger in their respective markets. Challenges can be surmounted and can even offer opportunities to grow and gain market share versus weaker competitors. Our companies have strong balance sheets and will be able to invest for growth while others won't be able to do so. With their strong balance sheets, they will also be on the lookout for M&A to create value for shareholders.

On May 1, 2023, the Fund's independent review committee (the "IRC") was increased to four members when Stéphanie Raymond-Bougie was appointed as an IRC member.

Related Party Transactions

National Bank of Canada ("the Bank") and its affiliated companies' roles and responsibilities related to the Fund are as follows:

Trustee, Custodian, and Registrar

Natcan Trust Company ("NTC"), a direct or indirect wholly-owned subsidiary of the Bank, is the Fund's trustee. In this capacity, it is the legal owner of the Fund's investments.

NTC acts as registrar for the Fund's securities and the names of securityholders. NTC also acts as the Fund's custodian. The fees for NTC's custodial services are based on the standard rates in effect at NTC.

Fund Manager

The Fund is managed by National Bank Investments Inc. ("NBII"), which is a wholly-owned subsidiary of the Bank. Therefore, NBII provides or ensures the provision of all general management and administrative services required by the Fund's current operations, including investment consulting, the arrangement of brokerage contracts for the purchase and sale of the investment portfolio, bookkeeping and other administrative services required by the Fund.

The Manager pays the operating expenses of the Fund other than its "Fund costs" (defined below) (the "variable operating expenses"), in exchange for the Fund's payment to the Manager of annual fixed-rate administration fees with respect to each series of the Fund.

The administration fees are equal to a specified percentage of the net asset value of each series of the Fund, calculated and paid in the same manner as the Fund's management fees. The variable operating expenses payable by the Manager include, but are not limited to: transfer agency and recordkeeping costs; custodial costs; accounting and valuation fees; audit fees and legal fees; costs of preparing and distributing financial reports, simplified prospectuses, annual information forms, Fund Facts, continuous disclosure material and other securityholder communications; and costs of trustee services relating to registered tax plans, as applicable.

In addition to administration fees, the Fund shall also pay certain Fund costs, namely: taxes (including, but not limited to, GST/HST and income taxes); costs of compliance with any changes to existing governmental or regulatory requirements introduced after August 1, 2013; costs of compliance with any new governmental or regulatory requirements, including any new fees introduced after August 1, 2013; interest and borrowing costs; costs related to external services that were not commonly charged in the Canadian mutual fund industry as at August 1, 2013; Independent Review Committee costs, including compensation paid to IRC members, travel expenses, insurance premiums and costs associated with their continuing education; and variable operating expenses incurred outside of the normal course of business of the Fund.

The Manager may, from time to time and at its sole discretion, decide to absorb a portion of a series' management fees, administration fees or Fund costs.

As described under the heading *Management Fees*, the Fund pays annual management fees to NBII as consideration for its services.

Portfolio Manager

The Manager has appointed National Bank Trust Inc. ("NBT"), an indirect wholly-owned subsidiary of the Bank, as the portfolio manager for the Fund. A flat fee is payable annually to NBT for its management services.

Distribution and Dealer Compensation

NBII acts as principal distributor for the Fund. In this capacity, NBII buys, sells and swaps securities through Bank branches and the National Bank Investments Advisory Service in Canadian provinces and territories, and through external registered representatives. Fund securities are also offered by National Bank Financial Inc. (including its division National Bank Direct Brokerage), CABN Investments (a division of NBII) and other affiliated entities. Brokers may receive, depending on the distributed series, a monthly commission representing a percentage of the average daily value of the securities held by their clients.

Brokerage Fees

The Fund may pay broker's commissions at market rates to a corporation affiliated with NBII. The brokerage fees paid by the Fund for the period are as follows:

Holdings

As at December 31, 2023, National Bank Investments Inc. held 299.88 Fund securities for a value of \$4,646.47, which represented close to 0.0102% of the net asset value of the Fund at that date. Transactions between National Bank Investments Inc. and the Fund were carried out in the normal course of business and at the Fund's net asset value as at the transaction date.

Registered Plan Trust Services

NTC receives a fixed amount per registered account for services provided as trustee for registered plans.

Administrative and Operating Services

The provision of certain services was delegated by the Fund Manager, NBII, to National Bank Trust Inc. ("NBT"), a wholly-owned indirect subsidiary of the Bank. These include accounting, reporting and portfolio valuation services. The fees incurred for these services are paid to NBT by the Fund manager.

Management Fees

The Fund pays annual management fees to the Fund manager for its management services. The fees are calculated based on a percentage of the Fund's daily net asset value before applicable taxes and are paid on a monthly basis. Under the *Distribution* heading, expenses include the broker's compensation consisting of the maximum annual trailer fees and sales commissions paid to brokers. Under the *Other* heading, the fees relate mainly to investment management, investment advisory services, general administration and profit. The breakdown of major services provided in consideration of the management fees, expressed as an approximate percentage of the management fees is as follows:

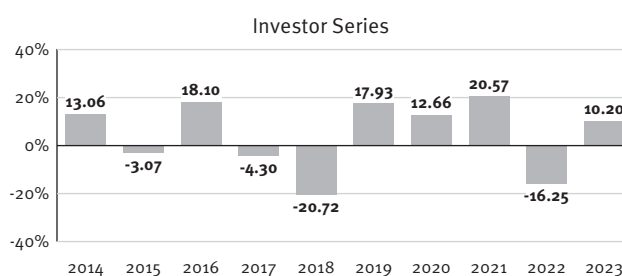

Management fees are negotiated with and paid directly by investors and are in addition to the fixed-rate administration fee. NBII does not pay any commissions or service fees to dealers who sell O Series units. There are no sales charges payable by investors who purchase O Series units.

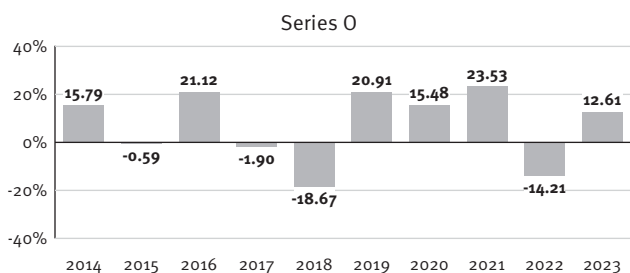
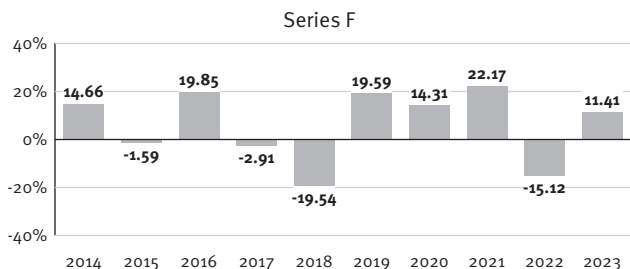
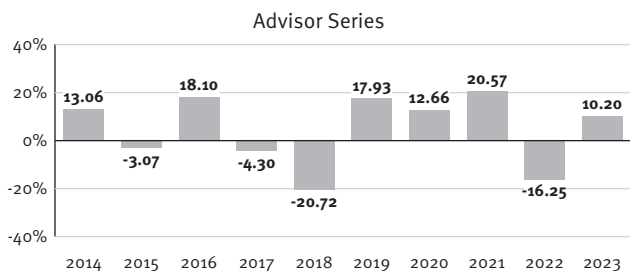
Past Performance
